Who or what has been your greatest professional inspiration?

My greatest professional inspiration has been my father. He came to Canada in 1959 from Italy without a possession to his name and not knowing a word of English. He grew up poor during the war, and his family moved to Canada to give their children an opportunity for a better life. His first job was in a gas station, where he began to pick up English, and he would go on to learn so much more in his life.

My father attended night school all his life, and by the time he passed away, he had earned a Ph.D., and was a world-recognized specialist in air pollution and water control systems. That was the legacy my father, Felix Degan, left for me: to always work to improve, progress and be educated.
